Research Ready Surrey Summary

What is Health and Social Care Research?

Health and social care research aim to find out new knowledge that could lead to changes to health treatments, policies, or care. It provides evidence for Integrated care systems to make the best decisions in designing, commissioning, and delivering services for local people.

Patients or other people with relevant experience contribute to how research is designed, conducted and the results shared.

Who is Research Ready Surrey?

Research Ready Surrey (RRS) is a partnership between Surrey Heartlands Health and Care Partnership, National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR), Surrey Community Action and Surrey VCSE Alliance. It is part of a national NHS England programme called Research Engagement Network Development (REND) created to support Integrated Care Systems (ICSs) to increase diversity in research participation.

RRS is the 6-month learning phase of a longer, phased programme of support to build the blocks for strong partnership working in Health and Care Research.

What was our plan?

From November 2023 to April 2024, our aims were to learn about research awareness and capability across the VCSE organisations in Surrey via interviews and a survey. We planned to develop a prototype dashboard using this information to facilitate research connections.

We also planned a far-reaching public engagement programme to raise awareness of research opportunities, and to understand where we can improve knowledge of health and care research within underserved communities.



What have we achieved?

1) **Mapping results:** 83 VCSE organisations responded to our online survey and here are some example results.



- % breakdown by activity: Research (15%), Insight (32%), Intelligence Gathering (38%), Neither (15%)
- Dissemination (49%), recruitment (55%), and data collection (63.7%) are the most frequent research-related activities (at least quarterly)
- Research-active VCSEs have most confidence in recruitment (77%), consent processes (71%) and data collection (67%).
- Research-active VCSEs have least confidence in applying for research funding (75%), policy analysis (62%) and analysing data (57%)



2) **Interactive dashboard:** We have developed a prototype dashboard from the eighty-three respondents which is undergoing user testing and refinement.



3) **Public engagement:** We have conducted detailed interviews which we will share as reports on the RRS website, and we have visited organisations across Surrey to raise awareness and understanding of Health and Care Research.



4) **Reciprocal learning:** We have listened to and learnt from our VCSE partners and hosted a programme end event at Dorking Halls on the 14th May to share findings and plan next steps.

Findings



- Communities understand the importance of research and want to learn more.
- Some VCFSEs have established research and others want to be involved but may lack skills, time, money, confidence.
- · Opportunities to share research opportunities, skills and impact are essential.
